is not only experienced by Christians but is experienced by everyone. As Christians, we have help in troubling times. Every day, I watch people face trying times


without Christ and see the hopelessness they are facing having nothing to base their hope in other than luck. You know the saying, "Maybe it will get better." But for the be-



IT'S Way TO BE **PROPPED UP** ON YOUR LEANING SIDE

Irecently read a story about a farmer who concluded a prayer by saying, "Lord, prop us up on our leaning side." When someone who heard the prayer asked the farmer what this meant, he explained that he had an old barn leaning to one side. To keep the structure from falling, he cut large beams and placed them on the" leaning side" of the barn. Simply put, the farmer had asked the Lord to prop them up on their leaning side where they were the most vulnerable to fall. Unfortunately, so many troubling things in life can cause us to become vulnerable and lean. And when we do lean, it's often on our own understanding, or lack of it, that we lean.

Proverbs 3:5 tells us to:
"Trust in the Lord with all your heart,
And lean not on your own understanding;

We all face troubling times in our lives which make no sense to us. We may speculate on why the situation occurred, but it's just that, speculation. Most of the time, we really don't understand. For example, it's hard to understand when people doing great things for the Lord pass away. Friends, family, pastors, leaders, and good people in our church. All of them, it seems, left this world far too soon, and it's impossible to make any sense of it. It's in those times of frustration and grief that I have asked God, "What are you doing?" In hind-sight, however, I realize my questioning came entirely from what I was leaning on at that moment, which was my understanding, or lack of it.

Commenting on Proverbs 3:5, the 17th Century theologian John Owen (1616-1683) said: "The great folly of man in tri-





als is leaning to or on his own understanding and counsels." Although it appears to be good, Owen said that ultimately, our own counsel results in stiffing our faith and letting us down. Proverbs gives us an alternative, though, and that alternative is to trust in the Lord. But what exactly does this look like?

According to Warren Wiersbe, the word translated "trust" in Proverbs 3:5 means "to lie helpless, facedown" like a "servant waiting for the master's command in readiness to obey."

I can certainly relate to feeling like I am helpless and face down. Perhaps that is how you feel in the middle of your troubles. Feelings of helplessness and uncertainty are often natural in those situations.

And according to Solomon, it's precisely in these times that we are to trust (lie face down before and ready to obey) the Lord with all our heart and not lean on our own understanding. The indication is that it's much better to fall down before God and be entirely dependent on Him than to rely on ourselves!




Clarke's words still ring true today. Unfortunately, and sadly, many believers are guilty of trying to live independently of God during difficult times. Of course, we trust the Lord where our eternity is concerned, but we find it easier to trust in ourselves or others before trusting God in the hard times. But I want to encourage you to trust and seek God rather than leaning on what you think you understand. Independence and self-sufficiency ultimately lead to disappointments, frustrations, and failures. But when we fall down before God as a sign of our dependence on Him and seek Him in all our battles, especially the battles we can't win on our own, they become His battles!

A great example of this is Jehoshaphat in 2 Chronicles 20. Trouble arose in the form of large enemy forces coming against him. Forces too large for him to defeat on his own. But he "set himself to seek the Lord" (v 3); he admitted his dependence on God by when he said, "we have no might against this enemy, but our eyes are upon You" (v. 12). This led to God speaking through a prophet telling Jehoshaphat not to fear the enemy forces because the battle was not Jehoshaphat's anymore; it was God's.

So, when the storms of life are raging, remember that it's better to trust in the Lord by admitting that we are entirely dependent on Him than to lean on what we understand. It's okay to be propped up on your leaning side!

But when we fall down before God as a sign of our dependence on Him and seek Him in all our battles, especially the battles we can't win on our own, they become His battles!

COMFORT

REALITY

The world is in a storm that is unprecedented in many ways. We know, of course, that the world is not perfect, but the season we are in has new challenges never faced by our generation. Although I have been serving the Lord for some time now, trusting is still challenging at times. It is not because He has ever failed me; it is just simply because in the natural, it is hard to trust for provision when you do not see a door for provision to come. It is much easier to walk according to what we see than what we do not. However, God calls us to walk by faith and not by sight. Though there are many days when we do not understand how we can survive or see a resolution to the problem we are facing, we can still trust in the One who can make a way where there is no way. We can trust IN GOD, even when we don't see His hand working. We can trust IN GOD because His character has been long established. I may not see Him working in the natural, but that does not mean He is not working. His character, how He operates, and who He is, proves that we

can trust IN GOD.

Trusting IN GOD plays out in dramatic fashion in 2 Chronicles 20. Multiple nations joined forces and created one of the largest armies the world had ever seen at that time, intending to destroy Judea and the people of God. When King Jehoshaphat learned what was happening, he did the only thing he knew to do; he sought the Lord. Scripture says that the people of Judea joined together and prayed together with the King leading. Jehoshaphat prayed, "O our God, will You not judge them? For we have no power against this great multitude that is coming against us; nor do we know what to do, but our eyes are upon You" (Vs. 12). I love the honesty in the King's voice. "we don't know what to do" is what he said. Have you ever felt like Jehoshaphat? After his confession of not knowing what to do, he told the Lord, "our eyes are one you". This was Jehoshaphat's declaration that he trusted IN GOD while he was scared and had no clue what to do. He trusted in God's character that He has not changed and how God had moved in the past, He could do once again. Jehoshaphat and the people of Judea waited in silence, expecting God to respond. The Lord speaks through the prophet Jahaziel and says, "You will not need to fight in this battle. Position yourselves, stand still and see the salvation of the Lord, who is with you, O Judah and Jerusalem!' Do not fear or be dismayed; tomorrow go out against them, for the Lord is with you" (Vs. 14-17).

The very next day, Jehoshaphat and the people of Judea went out armed not with swords and shields but with praise and faith. The Bible records, "Now when they began to sing and to praise the Lord set ambushes against the people of Ammon, Moab, and Mount Seir who had come against Judah and they were defeated" (Vs. 22). PRAISE THE LORD! God proved yet again that His character is to work for His



people, to bless them, keep them, and fight for them.

Lousia M.R. Stead married her husband in 1875, and shortly after, God blessed them both with a daughter, Lily. The Stead family took a vacation to Long Island Sound, New York. While the Stead family was there on the beach, they heard the cries of a boy out in the sea who the undertow had taken out from the shore. Mr. Stead rushed into the water to save him; however, the strength of the water proved to be too strong, and both the boy and Mr. Stead died. After going through this horrific experience, Mrs. Stead leaned on the Lord and later wrote from her experience: 'Tis so sweet to trust in Jesus,

and to take him at his word;

and How I've proved him o'er and o'er!
Jesus, Jesus, precious Jesus!
O for grace to trust him more!

just to rest upon his promise,

Jesus, Jesus, how I trust him!

and to know, "Thus saith the Lord."

Beloved, God has not changed. You can still trust IN GOD!

'Tis so sweet to trust in Jesus, and to take him at his word; just to rest upon his promise, and to know, "Thus saith the Lord." Jesus, Jesus, how I trust him! How I've proved him o'er and o'er! Jesus, Jesus, precious Jesus! O for grace to trust him more!

A few days before my husband passed, God led me to the scripture Psalm 121:1-2 during my morning Bible reading; little did I know days later, I would cling to those verses. I had to lift my eyes to the Lord and depend on His strength for the help I needed.

In the 23rd Psalm, David said "yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death." To me, the keyword in that verse is through. He didn't say yea, though, I'm stuck in this valley, yea though I'm going to die here in this valley. He said yea, though I walk through the valley. I don't know what valley you are walking through, but I want you to know you will walk through it. You won't stay in it, and most importantly, I want you to know God is faithful in all circumstances. I can attest that even when you walk through the valley of losing someone you love, if you walk with Jesus, you will walk through it victoriously.

There were many times when I asked

God the question, why? Why did this happen to us? We were serving in the church, raising our children to know and love the Lord, we were doing everything right we knew to do, yet this happened. I never got an answer to my question, but instead, I received peace that passed all understanding, strength when I didn't know if I could go on, and I trusted the Lord's sovereignty more than I ever had in my life. I saw the faith that my husband and I had taught our children rise up in them to a whole new level. I learned that at my husband's funeral, a man that had never stepped foot in a church came that day, and he heard the gospel preached, and I know he felt the Holy Spirit because He was so very real that day. Later, I learned that a man had started coming to church again because when Chris died, he realized that he and his family needed to be in church. You know what, they haven't missed a service since they started back. I don't have the space to tell all the wonderful things God has done over the past five years through

and during the tragedy of losing Chris.

I will end with my favorite story in the Bible, the story of the three Hebrew boys. They were thrown into the fire simply because they would not bow to an idol, but one of the keys to their deliverance was the faith they spoke before they were even in the fire. I love the part when the king looked in the fire and said, "I see four men loose walking in the midst of the fire, and they are not hurt, and the form of the fourth is like the son of God." I like to think maybe that while Jesus was walking around with them, he was holding their hands and encouraging them that even though they were surrounded by fire and their circumstances didn't look too great, they were going to make it. You may be in the midst of a fiery trial but remember Jesus is walking with you, and you will come out just like the Hebrew boys did, not even smelling like smoke. Keep reading His word, claiming his promises, speaking life over your situation, and watch what God will do!

WHEN I DON'T UNDERSTAND THE WAY, Can still trust the Way, Can still trust the Way,

Mommy, I've swallowed a quarter," I heard Hannah, who was three at the time, say quietly. Startled from where I was cooking supper, I called our on-call pediatrician, who advised us to go to the local ER for an x-ray. We left for the hospital.

After a series of x-rays, suddenly, the atmosphere changed two nurses came in very fast and began to put an IV in Hannah's hand and were explaining to us that the money she swallowed was lodged like a pendent very close to her windpipe, and she needed to go by ambulance to a children's hospital in downtown Atlanta. Within a few minutes, Scotty and Hannah are loaded into the ambulance, and I am following behind it.

As we drove, we prayed for the coin to move. I prayed with faith, believing that it would move. Our family and church family were praying as well. We arrived at the children's hospital, and Hannah had another x-ray. The coin had not budged. It was close to midnight by then, so the doctors decided to keep her in the hospital and if it had not moved by morning, they would do a procedure and go in and retrieve the coin.

Scotty and I have been praying, our family and friends are praying, and I just KNOW that coin has made its way on down. The coin did NOT move. It was still in the same place. At this point, the nurses took Hannah down for the

procedure to retrieve the coin.....

About two hours later, Hannah was brought back to her room, sleeping peacefully, and the nurse handed Scotty the coin (it was a penny). Several hours later, we were discharged, only to walk out and find not one but two flat tires on our car in downtown Atlanta. Somehow, we got our tires fixed and made it wearily home.

Later, I was troubled. I could not understand why that penny did not move. We were following God, and we were praying with authority, we believed it could move.... Why did it not move?

Two weeks later, I was watching a news program about hospital emergency rooms that did not have pediatric tools. A small child swallowed a pumpkin seed, and like Hannah's penny, the seed was hung in the child's throat. Also, like Hannah, they were sent by ambulance to a children's hospital. Unlike Hannah, when the ambulance doors opened, the child on the television program had died. The child died because the seed had moved!

I realized at that moment that if Hannah's penny had moved, it could have very well suffocated her. I was praying for the safety of my child, and my child was kept safe. I am so thankful that I learned that when I don't understand the way, I can still trust the waymaker.
