was 17 years old when I gave my life to the Lord. I will never forget that night. I can't remember what Michael Marchbanks preached, but I know that I felt the conviction of the Lord. When the altar call was given, I did what I used to do best - I ran - not to the altar but to the church foyer, thinking if I could hang out there long enough that the feeling of conviction would leave me. As the altar service began to wind down, I went back into the sanctuary, sat down about halfway back (I didn't want to

get too close to the altar), and waited for dismissal. I'm not sure what happened, but a second altar call was given, and the conviction began to grow again. This time I did not wait as long. I got up and made my way to the fover again. After a moment or two in the foyer, the conviction of the Lord began to subside, and again, I returned to

the sanctuary, but this time I sat down in the back of the church. As the altar service was ending and the dismissal prayer was about to be given, a lady in the church, Sue Armour, couldn't leave until she testified. I still feel her words today and they went something like this - "God is calling someone tonight. Don't leave here without knowing Him." Once she finished speaking I ran again. But this time, it was to an altar to give my life to the Lord, and I was saved by His grace that night.

My salvation story explains why I think the Lord is "The Difference". Even though I turned Him away twice that night, He did not give up on me. He kept calling, He kept loving, and He never grew angry. Instead, He met me at that altar when I finally made my way there. God is a God of judgment, but what is fantastic and different from any person or authority that I have to deal with is that His judgment is based on and comes from His character of love. The Bible often speaks of God's long-suffering, and I was one in need of that long-suffering.

I wish my story after salvation were one of a trajectory that evidenced a committed walk with the Lord. Instead, it is one of walking close only to drift away. The first twelve years of my walk with God were a mess. I have often said that the church had a revolving door for me, and I was constantly in and out. I knew from age 19 that God was calling me to preach, but I was unwilling to submit to that calling. I never totally left God and didn't see myself as wrong. However, I did not want to meet God in eternity like I was living. Eventually, God did draw me back to Him to a place of commitment to follow Him fully. I wish I could say I made no more selfish decisions, self-imposed mistakes, or wrong choices, but I can't. I do know and realize that God never gave up on me. As long as I would always turn to Him, cry out to Him, and repent for my failures, He was ALWAYS there to forgive, restore and

> strengthen me. I have found out that the things I failed in earlier in my Christian walk now are places of strength because I allow Jesus to be my strength in those weaknesses. Philippians 4:13 (my life verse) says, "I can do all things through Christ which strengtheneth me."

I recently preached a message and shared that I have done everything wrong to get to be in the place I am today. By this I mean that I have made wrong decisions at times, and God has never given up on me, even with these wrong decisions. He calls me, leads me, reminds me who I am in Him, and accepts my prayer to Him, and like David, He searches my heart, cleanses my heart, and gives me the strength to grow in Him. I am glad to say that I grow closer to Him every day because He makes it possible to do so.

I would say I have tried the patience of God. **The Difference** with God in comparison to my loved ones and friends is that He never says that's enough. He was always ready to forgive and restore, and every time I called on Him, His longsuffering offered me love and mercy rather than judgment. I deserved judgment. I deserved to be a failure in my Christian walk, but the Difference was that God knew the plans He had for me and desired to use me in those plans.



How God Is Different from other people in your life

Proverbs 24:16 reads, "For a just man falleth seven times, and riseth up again: but the wicked shall fall into mischief."

This may be the most significant difference between God and people, even those we know and love. If this difference had to be summed up into one word, I believe that word would be mercy.

I have made many mistakes (fallen) in my life, both before and after becoming a follower of Christ. Sometimes I wonder why the number in Proverbs 24:16 is so low. Instead of 7, it seems it should be 77, 777, or even 7,777! However, I think the point made by Solomon is that even a just person is subject to come up short more than once. The good news, however, is that the just person can rise again. But how? Is it because the just person is somehow stronger than the wicked who falls into mischief? Does the just person have more discipline or willpower than the wicked person, which keeps the just from falling into mischief? I don't think so. I believe the significant difference between why a just person rises again and a wicked person falls into mischief is not that the just person is stronger than the wicked, or more talented, or not even necessarily more spiritual. I think the significant difference in why a just person can rise again (and again) is because the just person has a Redeemer to help them up. The just person knows that, in reality, they are not so "just." Instead of trying to rise in their own power and strength, they put their faith in Christ, who is strong when we are weak.

We are all human and are subject to falling and failing many times. And after falling and failing many times, people, even the people we love, can become discouraged and give up on us, and we may even give up on ourselves. But God never gives up on us! God always finishes His work (John 19:30), and He desires to complete the work He has started in us (Philippians 1:6). After all, He is "the

Author and Finisher of our faith" (Hebrews 12:2), and I believe He intends to finish it!

In Psalm 138:8, David said, "The LORD will perfect that which concerneth me: thy mercy, O LORD, endureth forever: forsake not the works of thine own hands." The word "perfect" here means "to complete" in the original Hebrew. David recognized that God would complete the things concerning him, and David also recognized that because the Lord's mercy endured forever, He would not forsake the works of His hands. David realized that God was still working on him. A just person arises when they accept that God needs to work on them some more.

The Lord told Jeremiah to go to the potter's house to receive a Word. When Jeremiah arrived, he described what he saw. He said the potter "wrought a work on the wheels. And the vessel that he made of clay was marred in the hand of the potter: so, he made it again another vessel, as seemed good to the potter to make it. Then the word of the Lord came to me, saying, 'O house of Israel, cannot I do with you as this potter? saith the Lord. Behold, as the clay is in the potter's hand, so are ye in mine hand, O house of Israel'" (Jer. 18:3-6).

The potter took the "marred" clay (which means it was "ruined," "decayed," "corrupt," and subject to be "cast off") and placed it back on the wheel and made it into something that "seemed good" to him. God is the Potter, and we are the clay. Maybe you feel marred in some way

or another as you read this. If so, please remember that you are still worth something in the hands of the Potter. Because of His love and mercy toward us, instead of throwing us (the clay) away, He (the Potter) puts us back on the wheel and forms us into something good. Yes! Even you and me, marred clay, He can make into something beautiful, and that is what He wants to do! He won't give up on us, which makes Him dif-

ferent from people.

Melcome Church is just a small church in the woods surrounded by cow fields. On our first Sunday, there were about 15 people present and one adult Sunday School class. However, we had never been so happy as when we came to pastor this congregation. God had given us a burden and a love for this small church and the wonderful people who attended it. The first several years of growth were slow. We added one youth Sunday School class, and on Wednesday nights, there were often only five people in attendance. We had a heart for our community and began to reach out as much as possible. God slowly added to the church. One of the earliest outreaches held was a one-day VBS giving out backpacks and school supplies. We were astounded when over a hundred children showed up. That little sanctuary was packed out with more people than had ever been on the property. It seemed after every community event; God added another family to the church. After ten years of pastoring, the new sanctuary was built to hold our growing congregation. The old sanctuary

Welcome is currently involved in our local Hospice and Cancer Care centers, Guardian ad litem, and the pregnancy care center. We partner with our local public schools and even have an after-school bible club for kids at a public elementary school. We continue to have nursing home ministries, an annual VBS, walk-through Nativities, and backpack giveaways. We are always seeking new ways to show the love of Jesus to our community. The newer Sanctuary at Welcome Church is almost full as well. Our congregation loves people and truly lives up to the church name, "Welcome." We have been blessed recently to purchase additional property for parking, and we are continuing to pray and follow God's leading about what is next. Not a Sunday morning goes by that we don't have a visitor from the community walk through those doors. The words of 2 Corinthian 9:6 have certainly proven to be true, "But this I say, He which soweth sparingly shall reap also sparingly; and he which soweth bountifully shall reap also bountifully." My hands scribble notes on sheet music—Beethoven's hand's composed symphonies. My hands doodle stick figures. The hands of Michelangelo painted masterpieces. The difference is whose hands held the pen and paintbrush.

A slingshot in my hands is a toy; a sling in David's hands defeated a giant. A staff in my hands is good for hiking; a staff in Moses' hands is good for parting the Red Sea. A trumpet in my hands barely makes a sound; trumpets in the Israelites' hands crumbled Jericho walls.

Ordinary objects in extraordinary hands do exceptional things. Skilled hands. Perfected by practice. Disciplined by determination. Anointed by the Almighty.

Mud in Jesus' hands healed blindness. Fish and loaves in Jesus' hands fed thousands. Nails in Jesus' hands defeated Satan. His hands still heal sickness. His hands still provide needs. And His hands still conquer sin. The difference is whose hands you are in.

WHAT A SAVIOR

There have been times in my life I've responded wrong in situations. When I ask for mercy and forgiveness from even the most patient people, the response is often, "I need a minute." The difference with the Lord is He has never needed a minute. He's never needed time to process my motive or reasoning.

I was standing in the hallway of a church parsonage at 19, one month away from getting married and relocating to a new state. I was in a very heated discussion with my mamma and daddy. My car had just been totaled by a driver who wasn't watching and hit me from behind. I was so frustrated that this had happened. My daddy said, "Deb, God is going to take care of you through this." My emotional response was, "If there is a god?" I braced myself for his reaction. In a loud, bold voice, he said; "Debra!" My mama's quick, gentle response was, "Billy, The Lord knows Debra." Those words immediately brought a calm and reminder to me of to whom I belong.

The day my mama passed away, I remembered a family portrait. This time I kept seeing it differently than before. It was of my daddy, momma, two siblings, and myself. I was in the picture, but the rest of the family had disappeared. There I was at five years old, a little girl sitting in the same position, but they were gone. In reality, this is how it would be with the death of my mama. A severe and crippling sense of loneliness covered me. It took my breath. All of a sudden, I had the thought. The Lord is the patriarch of the family. How could I ever feel alone? He had been a part of every

meal at the family table. He had been present every Christmas Morning. He had witnessed the laughter, and the stories had been present at every birth and, yes, at every death. Psalms 36:7 states, "How excellent Is thy loving kindness, O God! Therefore the children of men put their trust under the shadow of the wings."

Growing up in a Christian home, I witnessed time and time again God's goodness. Writing today reminds me of a day Daddy brought a man to supper. He was hungry and homeless, asking if Daddy could provide a hotel room for just one night so he could get rest. Daddy asked him to bless the meal. Mama said she had never heard anything like it. In leaving, He and Daddy stepped out the kitchen door together. Daddy turned, and he was gone. Hebrews 13:2 says some have entertained angels unaware. They both always felt they had had a visitation.

As I've grown older, I am still learning the nature of Christ. I'm overwhelmed by his affection towards me. I still hear those assuring words spoken by my sweet moma, "The Lord knows Debra." The scripture Hosea 5:15 says in their affliction will they seek me early. We live in a world that is longing for connection, searching for direction, and desperate for answers. As Christians, we have the solution. In my time of loss, efforts, my times of frustration, seeking guidance, and even trying to demand answers, I realize now more than ever all God wanted was me.
