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## MEN OF GOD

**1** A **7**hen the term "Man of God" is used, we often think directly of preachers, pastors, and evangelists who preach the gospel, but "men of God" are simply men who love and serve the Lord in their manhood. Men and women have roles designed by and responsibilities given by God. Some of these roles and callings may intersect where a man or woman can accomplish the given calling based on whom God called. But there are other roles and calling designed by God to be specifically for men or women, and we must not only accept these roles but also embrace them as a part of our daily lives. Society is working hard to erase these specific roles, especially the role of a man, in the name of equality. God explicitly instructs in His word on the roles of men and women (Genesis 2; Ephesians 5; 1 Peter 3; 1 Corinthians 7) while stating that neither is higher in status, but each is equal (Galatians 3:26-29; Colossians 3:1; Ephesians 5:21) in God's sight. As men, we must embrace the roles before us, not looking to be rulers but instead looking to serve our families and community as God's leaders.

One of the best books I have read about being a man of God is Model Man: From Integrity to Legacy, written by Larry Stockstill. (I encourage every men's group to use this study for promoting and building godly men.) This book is a candid look at the issue of godly manhood needed in our homes, churches, and society. It challenges every man to accept the godly role God has designed for him. Pastor Stockstill has listed several characteristics that men of godliness and integrity models and displays. While not exhaustive, this list speaks to us to challenge us to accept the role of a Model Man.

Today more than ever, we need model men who stand out from the common run of humanity as men of godliness and integrity.

- Model men honor their wives.
- Model men pay their bills and keep their word.
- Model men take responsibility.
- Model men vote their conscience.

- Model men pray for revival.
- Model men drive in traffic jams and wait in frustrating Walmart checkout lines with a sense of being watched by others as an example.
- Model men shun pornographic filth and flirting Facebook fans.


• Model men live it before they say it.


• Model men model it before they demand it.

Let me preface my article by saying that I had a lot of choices to pick from of men who have influenced me over the years so it was indeed a difficult task. My choice is a result of a compilation of experiences with a person whose impact on my life has been for a number of years from the time I started in ministry to where I am today. I have gleaned much from many over the years, but only one person has influenced me in every stage of my life in ministry, and that person is Billy Anderson.

Brother Billy Anderson was the World Missions Director for the CHC in the mid 90's when I became active in ministry. The first time I met him in person was around 1997 when he preached the Piedmont Springs Camp Meeting in North Alabama. Prievioulsy I only knew him by name and that he was well respected in the CHC.

In 2005 I moved to North Georgia to pastor the Bethel Temple CHC. During VBS we would invite general officials to come each night to share from their wisdom and experiences. The offering we received during VBS usually went to support World Missions so we would ask Brother Billy to come on the last night to present it to him which allowed me an opportunity to get to know him on a more personal level. In the spring of 2008, I asked him to come and minister and he encouraged the church to send me on a mission trip with him. I was blessed to travel to Nicaragua and Cuba later that year as well as other trips in the future. Little did we know at the time, but Brother Billy was introducing me to a way of life that I would one day live.

During these trips I was able to visit several churches and meet pastors along with people who attended the churches. This experience changed my idea of World Missions altogether. As a pastor, I had always been taught to support missions which I did, but my experience on these trips took this to another level. It's one thing to raise money to sup-

port missions and see pictures, but it's another thing entirely to see first hand how the lives of people are transformed by this support.

I was also able to observe how Brother Billy interacted with people which helped me to understand how valuable our relationships are with our brothers and sisters from other tribes, tongues, and nations and how important it is to help them. Brother Billy demonstrated the compassion a World Missions Director must have and this is evidenced in his accomplishments in our foreign works over the span of several years. This compassion for others was the catalyst which motivated him to make things happen during the years he served. Today, countless people I meet around the world still hold Brother Billy in high esteem after nearly fifteen years of being retired from being the World Missions Executive Director because of the impact he had on them. Thankfully I have been able to observe and learn first hand from him and his compassion has rubbed off on me and enabled me to be more successful than I would have been otherwise.

There are many ideas today about masculinity. Terms such as "toxic masculinity" assert that a definition of masculinity in which men should suppress their emotions can be "toxic" which may have some merit. The Biblical view of masculinity seems to be one that is centered around strength. In 1 Corinthians 16:13, Paul said, "Watch ye, stand fast in the faith, quit you like men, be strong." In other words, "Be watchful, stand firm in the faith, act like men, be strong." Other views aside from Scripture also suggest that strength is a key to masculinity. Wikipedia said that, "traits traditionally viewed as masculine in Western society include strength, courage, independence, leadership, and assertiveness."

In an opinion article in Liberty University's student newspaper The Liberty Champion titled, "THE TENSION BETWEEN BIBLICAL MASCULINITY AND TOXIC MASCULINITY," Justin Bower writes, "According to the Bible and by the example of Christ, masculinity is humble leadership. It is sacrificial love and incredible meekness."

Humility, sacrifice, and meekness are evident in someone who has great strength of character and I have observed this strength in Brother Billy Anderson for nearly 30 years. Authentic Manhood produced several videos in "The 33 Series" which aimed to help develop men in their walk with the Lord. These videos teach that, "Strong, authentic men build strong families, churches and communities". Brother Billy Anderson has certainly been a "builder" of all three of these for many years and I am honored that the influence of such a great man of God still has an impact on myself and others today. Thank you Brother Billy for allowing God to use you to make many of us better men!


#### **BRASWELL CHC**



Biblical manhood is under attack in American culture. Theological masculinity in our society is now labeled "toxic masculinity" by professors on college campuses and politicians on Capitol Hill. Men are rarely portrayed as role models in music and movies from Nashville and Hollywood. Godly manhood is sadly an endangered species in the classroom and in the conference room. Men are abdicating their responsibilities as fathers and husbands in the home. We desperately need Christian leadership in our churches, our community, and our culture; leaders like Ezra in the Old Testament.

For Ezra had prepared his heart to seek the law of the LORD, and to do it, and to teach in Israel statutes and judgments (Ezra 7:10). First, he loved the Word with his heart. Second, he learned the Word with his head. Third, he lived the Word with his hands. And finally, he left the Word with his heritage. Thankfully, I have a man in my life who exemplifies this verse, my dad, Dollas Messer. He is the best preacher I have ever heard. He was the best man at my wedding. He is my best friend.
