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# He Is He Is

Cor every born-again believer, three specific  $\Gamma$  times in history are crucial to our belief. One is the death on the cross of our Savior, Jesus. Another is the resurrection of our Savior, Jesus. These are two of the most powerful times in the history of humanity and are lynchpin moments for the Christian faith. However, without this third event, neither the death nor resurrection of our Savior, Jesus, would have been possible, and that event is the miraculous birth of our Savior, Jesus. While all three events had to happen for Jesus to truly be the savior of the world, the first two I mention are filled with pain, anguish, and uncertainty of His followers. The last is filled with rejoicing and celebration of the moment that God intervened in the life of humanity to make for Himself an avenue by which humanity could have a relationship with Him that was not known to mankind since the time of Adam.

As we approach another Christmas season, it is hard to do so without thinking about the joyous moment that God made a magnificent entrance to this earth as a baby in a manager in that little town of Bethlehem. Luke 2:8-14 records the glorious announcement of that moment:

8 And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. 9 And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the Glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. 10 And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. 11 For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord. 12 And this shall be a sign unto you; Ye shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger. 13 And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying 14 Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, goodwill toward men.

As the announcement of Jesus' birth is being made, a host of angels join in, proclaiming, "Glory to God in the highest." This statement is so powerful. It is the proclamation that God has overcome the sin of mankind. The sin of humanity had separated them from God; now, God is with us. Even though He, Jesus, has not taught one time, healed a blind man, cast out a demon, walked on water, forgiven one taken in adultery, or witnessed to a broken women at a well, He is here to accomplish all of this and

even more. His love for His people made Him willing to come to this earth to set right and restore what man corrupted and broke. This is why Christmas is filled with such hope. It's the beginning of restoration and gives hope that all things can be better in Jesus. The Glory of God (and Christmas) is that God has achieved (in Jesus) what is impossible for man to do. Humanity could only dream of a way back to God, while Jesus made the way and became the way. The Glory means there is hope, and no situation cannot be overcome through Jesus.

Christmas is about two things: hope and giving. Jesus gave us that we might have hope. So, every year when Christmas comes, my thoughts go to giving and hope. The kind of giving I'm talking about is giving of self, even as Jesus did. Giving and receiving presents is nice, but the joy Christmas brings reminds us that we can give freely just as we have been given to. Helping, serving, and even fellowshipping have a powerful effect on those receiving such. It brings the question. What can I do to share Jesus, as Jesus was shared with us? Giving always leads to hope. Nothing is impossible with God, and Christmas brings that reminder to us every year.

The Glory of Christmas is that we are reminded how good God is and how good we can be to each other. The final statement the host of angels made was, "...on earth peace, goodwill toward men." When I think of what God gave and the hope it brought, I find myself engulfed in His peace and a beneficiary of His goodwill. There is no feeling like Godly, peace, hope, and giving, and that comes from the Glory of Christmas: Jesus, the Savior, Christ the Lord.

### Legacy Lives On

David Hodges was one of a kind. He left a legacy of character and faith. He left a legacy of unity. He left a legacy of love.

ev. David Hodges spent most of his life in ministry alongside his wife, Retha Hodges. He was ordained with the Congregational Holiness



Church in 1971 and, from there, set out to be all he could for the Kingdom of God. He pastored Raiford Church Macclenny, Fl, for three years. He also served the Congregational Holiness Church denomination, pastoring churches in the Florida district. He pastored

Sanderson CHC for 3 years, Pine Valley (currently Safe Harbor) CHC for 20 years, and Manntown CHC for 23 years until our Lord called him Home. He served the Florida District CHC as Secretary for 18 years and District Superintendent for 24 years. He left this world holding positions as Pastor of Manntown and Superintendent of the Florida district.

He was a great mentor to many and loved to put into those who sought wisdom. We don't know how many souls were saved under his ministry, but what we do know is that the number of seeds he planted throughout his ministry is innumerable. Serving God was his number one priority, and serving the body of Christ was his second. Nothing ever made him question whether or not the journey would be worth it. There's not a doubt in anyone's mind when he sees the face of Jesus and he hears, "Well done thou good and faithful servant," that he would do it all again. He was the same man outside of the pulpit as he was

standing behind it. He was quick to give God the glory in every accomplishment in his life. He had a heart for the future generation and spent his last days at youth camps across our denomination's southern states. He was an encouragement to young ministers and everyone he came in contact with. The shoes he left behind will never be filled, but he had high hopes that our district would go on for generations. He left a legacy of looking forward, loving others, and serving well. He was one of the most faithful servants you could have known. He was known for opening every message he preached with these words: "If no one has told you today that they love you, let me be the first to tell you that I love you!"

That sums up the kind of man David Hodges was. If he were here, he would encourage and challenge us to let our lives speak of our salvation without words and honor God in all we do. He would encourage each one to leave a legacy of knowing Christ and making Him known. May our hearts learn to love souls and seek to win them to Christ the way David Hodges always did. He left the greatest legacy he possibly could have for his children, grandchildren, church, and district! Heaven is undoubtedly sweeter with him there.





### Life Changing

What must it have looked like when the sky filled with a "multitude of heavenly hosts"? What was a dark night sky was, in a moment, changed into wonder and beautiful light and color. It must have been a moment the men of the fields never forgot for the rest of their lives. How glorious and wonderful the presence of the Lord must have been. Scripture refers to the glory that shined around the shepherds in the field. I believe that my experience at the altar is also what the shepherds experienced as the glory of God covered them. I believe tears were streaming down their face, I believe they felt the weight of the glory of God, and I believe they loved every second of it.

The best news that I can share is that you and I can still experience the glory of God today! I believe that God desires to saturate us in His presence on a daily basis. He calls to us to come closer. God wants us to dive into His Word, sing praises to Him, and meditate on Him day and night. As we turn our eyes on Him and worship Him, He will cause His glory to shine around us. Let me encourage you today to find a place of prayer, seek the Lord, and watch what God will do!

"Well, Glory!"

We often hear this exclamation during church services, camp meetings, youth camps, and humorously, when someone unveils any kind of desert—okay, maybe that's just me. But what does "Glory" actually mean, and why did angels shout it at Jesus' birth?

Glory signifies great honor or prestige earned through notable achievements. The angels were aware of the extraordinary event unfolding on Earth. It was no ordinary night; it was the moment when God wrapped Himself in flesh. On this night, God's heart began to beat within a human chest, pumping blood that would be shed 33 years later to redeem us. The angels recognized that God had altered history forever on this magical night.

Christmas always felt magical growing up, with family gatherings, gifts, and even my aunt's weird purple concoction, which was oddly endearing. As children, we're captivated by the holiday's charm, seeing magic in every detail. We would go over to my grandmother's house, open presents, eat, and then sit around the fireplace while my grandmother tearfully read Luke chapter 2. However, as adults, the wonder often fades, overshadowed by the

worries and stresses of gifts, events, schedules, and, yes, even the mysterious purple dish whose contents remain a secret. It's easy to get overwhelmed during the holidays and miss what it is really all about.

Do me a favor... When you find yourself missing the Christmas magic, remember that amazing night. Cast your mind back to the scene: a young Mary about to give birth, riding a camel (good going Joseph), the inn being full, a baby born to a virgin, swaddled and laid in a manger, Mary, Joseph, and a few barn animals witnessing this miracle, the innkeeper who didn't know that God had just been born in his stable, the star that marked the birth of redemption to all mankind.

Then the angels... This child, born and clothed in humanity yet divine, was witnessed by angels who knew his true identity. And overwhelmed by the miracle, they can't help but shout,

"Glory to God in the Highest, and on earth peace, goodwill toward men!"



In June of 2023, Royal Rangers from the Congregational Holiness Church visited the U.S. Space & Rocket Center in Huntsville, Alabama, for our annual Camporee, where America's fascination and determination for space exploration is on full display. As I saw exhibits, pictures, and videos of celestial skies and distant galaxies, Scriptures like Psalm 8:3-4 flooded my mind. "When I consider Thy heavens, the work of Thy fingers, the moon and the stars, which Thou hast ordained; what is man, that Thou art mindful of him?"

The Psalmist wrote the heavens declare the glory of God (Psalm 97:6). Flying in an airplane or star gazing in your backyard proves that point. The Prophets wrote the earth is full of His glory (Isaiah 6:3; Habakkuk 2:14). Visits to Niagara Falls or the Grand Canyon affirm those truths. A hike in the woods with blooming flowers or a stroll on the beach with roaring waves reminds us that the whole earth is filled with His glory (Psalm 72:19).

Yet the greatest display of the glory of God is not seen in the Milky Way, the Rocky Mountains, or the Pacific Ocean. The glory of Creation cannot compare to the glory of the Incarnation, for the Word who spoke the world into existence became flesh and bone and dwelled among us. The angels declared, "Glory to God in the Highest," to the Bethlehem shepherds. The disciples witnessed, "We beheld His glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth" (John 1:14). The glory of

God radiated in the face of Jesus Christ (2 Corinthians 4:6). His miracles were manifestations of his glory (John 2:11).

As the Father of Glory (Ephesians 1:17) His glory came first by acceptance at the altar (Isaiah 60:7). Next His glory filled the Tabernacle in the wilderness and the Temple in Jerusalem (Exodus 40:34; 2 Chronicles 7:2). Then the glory of latter temple was greater than the former temple because Jesus was tabernacled among us (Haggai 2:9). Now we have this treasure in earthen vessels by the power of the Holy Ghost with the glory of God in the Church (Romans 9:23; 2 Corinthians 3:18, 4:7; Ephesians 3:21). We eagerly await Jesus' triumphant return in His great glory to rule and reign for eternity (Matthew 25:31; Mark 13:26).

Soon the Holy City of New Jerusalem will be filled with the glory of God. (Revelation 21:23). Jesus prayed, "Father, I will that they also, whom thou hast given me, be with me where I am; that they may behold my glory," (John 17:24). One day His prayer will be answered. We will see Jesus, who is the God of Glory over creation, the King of Glory with His Incarnation, and the Lord of Glory at His coronation (Psalm 29:3; Psalm 24:10; James 2:1). We shall see Him as He is (1 John 3:2)!
